What is it and is it a good thing?

ommunication and the role it plays in successful relationships... At camp we have come to realize that proper communication is the cornerstone to successful problem solving and solid relationships. Many things come into play as we are able to come to the spot where we can trust and freely communicate. As I think of this fact, I'm drawn to think of communication as the world sees it, then also as the Bible would point out. What is the difference?

Transparency in the business world refers to openly sharing information, decisions, and processes with stakeholders, including employees, customers, investors, and the public. It involves being honest, forthcoming, and clear in communication, even when discussing difficult topics or acknowledging mistakes.

Transparency is viewed as a good thing in the business world for several reasons, Building Trust, Accountability, Enhancing Reputation and Encouraging Innovation and Collaboration.

Though transparency in the business world is good, it involves onesided communication much of the time. They are communicating their values to the world in a way that they can attract customers. (Continued on next page)

In terms of Biblical concepts related to communicating wisely and maintaining a balance of open transparency, several principles come to mind:

Proverbs 11:14: "For lack of guidance a nation falls, but victory is won through many advisers." This verse highlights the importance of seeking counsel and input from others before making decisions. Wise communication involves listening to different perspectives and considering the implications of sharing certain information.

Proverbs 15:22: "Plans fail for lack of counsel, but with many advisers, they succeed." Similar to the previous verse, this emphasizes the value of seeking advice and wisdom from others. Communicating wisely involves discerning when and how to share information, taking into account the input of trusted advisers.

Ephesians 4:15: "Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will grow to become in every respect the mature body of him who is the head, that is, Christ." This verse encourages speaking the truth in a manner that is both honest and compassionate. Wise communication involves being truthful while also considering the impact of our words on others.

In **Luke 14:28-30**, Jesus says, "For which of you, desiring to build a tower, does not first sit down and count the cost, whether he has enough to complete it? Otherwise, when he has laid a foundation and is not able to finish, all who see it begin to mock him, saying, 'This man began to build and was not able to finish." This verse emphasizes the importance of careful planning and consideration before undertaking any significant endeavor, such as building a tower. This applies to communicating as a group and making decisions. Have we been open enough that we can accurately count the cost?

When applied to communication, does this suggest that, before we speak, we should carefully consider the potential consequences and implications of our words? What about keeping one's opinions and desires to oneself, valuing others' desires, and expressing one's needs in a way that addresses others' concerns?

In **Philippians 2:3-4** it says "Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility, value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests, but each of you to the interests of the others." This principle emphasizes humility, selflessness, and empathy in interpersonal interactions. Instead of prioritizing our own opinions or desires, we are encouraged to consider the needs and interests of others. By valuing others above ourselves and being attentive to their concerns, we can foster understanding and cooperation.

In practical terms, this principle suggests that when expressing our needs or desires, we should do so in a manner that considers the perspectives and concerns of others. It involves active listening, empathy, and finding solutions that address everyone's interests. Let's not forget to include our own interests here, we are a part of the group.

Additionally, **Proverbs 15:1** offers further guidance on effective communication: "A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger." This verse underscores the importance of using gentle and respectful language when expressing our needs or opinions, as it can help facilitate productive dialogue and avoid conflict.

Where in communication does the verse about not turning back after we start ploughing fit in? In **Luke 9:62**, Jesus says, "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for service (Continued on page 10)





Camp Library



"We've got to be back in time for Trading Post, boys!" What a good feeling to roll back into camp tired but with a a lot of good memories tucked under our belts to save for later.





in the kingdom of God." This verse emphasizes the importance of commitment and perseverance in following Jesus and serving God's kingdom.

While this does pertain to decisions that have been made, and how you shouldn't falter between two opinions after a decision has been made, when applied to communication, this concept highlights the importance of being resolute and steadfast in our words and actions. Here's how it relates to good communication:

- 1. Commitment to Integrity: Just as someone who puts their hand to the plow commits to moving forward without looking back, good communicators commit to honesty, transparency, and integrity in their communication. They uphold their values and principles, even in the face of challenges or temptations to compromise.
- 2. Consistency and Reliability: Effective communication requires consistency and reliability. When we commit to our words and follow through on our promises, we build trust and credibility with others. Like someone plowing a field without looking back, we stay focused on our goals and responsibilities, demonstrating reliability and dependability.
- 3. Clarity of Purpose: When we put our hand to the plow, we have a clear sense of purpose and direction. Similarly, good communicators articulate their intentions clearly and stay focused on the desired outcome. They avoid distractions and maintain clarity of purpose in their communication, ensuring that their message is conveyed effectively.

Biblical principles such as seeking counsel, speaking the truth in love, and considering the implications of our words can guide us in communicating wisely and maintaining a balance of transparency in our interactions. The biblical principle of valuing others above ourselves and considering their interests guides us to communicate and interact with humility, empathy, and sensitivity to the needs of others, while also addressing our own needs in a constructive manner. There are times when the charitable way in communicating is actually staying silent. The concept of putting your hand to the plow without looking back emphasizes the importance of commitment, integrity, clarity of purpose, and perseverance in communication.

By embodying these qualities, we can communicate more freely and effectively. We will take into effect the needs and desires of others while addressing our own needs and stick firmly to our beliefs effectively, making a positive impact in our interactions with others.
